




Krefft's River Turtle



Reptile

- Eggs has tough shell
- Eggs laid in warm, dry place
- Bluetongue has live young
- Eggs fertilised inside female's body
- Reptile has dry skin from which grow scales
- Ectothermic: cold-blooded
- Reptiles usually breath through lungs
- Reptiles eat animals and plants


